On Thursday we visited **Henry Springer's** large ware rooms and saw a sight sufficient to excite, the pride of any denizen of Albuquerque interested in its material progress. In one room were piles upon piles of ready made clothing, bales of cotton, linens, domestic sheeting and calicos, boxes of shoes, and shelves filled with small articles of hardware. Another room, had flour and bacon in sacks, the flour on one side and bacon on the other, in piles reaching from the floor to the ceiling. Another room, one had barely space enough to walk between the tiers of boxes, bags and barrels, containing groceries of all kinds from a nutmeg to a choice brand of "Old Bourbon." The latter suited our taste exactly, if anyone doubts this statement, let him try for himself. In our wanderings here we encountered something in stone bottles, which, upon interviewing **Mr. Springer**, we learned was Scotch Ale, all the way from Edinburgh. Another room was filled-with barrels of whisky and wines, and cases of lard, coal oil etc. The last room entered was one adjoining the salesroom; this is now being fitted up as an addition to the store, even here, **Mr. Springer** had to store a large quantity of table ware. When this room is finished and by the removal of a partition, made a part of his regular store, it will be the largest one in town. We asked **Mr. Springer** when he thought he could sell such a large stock of goods, and were informed they would last him probably six months. There are now several wagons en route from Carson with hardware, notions groceries destined for him.

RELIEF FOR THE NEEDY

Meeting for the Benefit of the Poor

In compliance with the published call, a meeting was held on Monday the 30th day of March A.D. 1874, at the Court-house in Albuquerque, for the purpose of devising some plan for the relief of those persons and families in Bernillo County, who are suffering for the lack of the common necessaries of life. On motion, the following officers were elected and installed:

PRESIDENT, Salvador Armijo

VICE PRESIDENTS, Mariano Yassari and Atancio Montoya

SECETARIES, Francisco Armijo y Otero and Harry R. Whiting

After the objects of the meeting were thoroughly explained by the President; at the close of a discussion as to the most proper means of collecting and distributing the relief desired, Charles W. Lewis, **Henry Springer** and Salvador Armijo were appointed a Committee on Contributions. The committee was instructed to receive contributions and distribute the same in such manner as may be deemed by them most expedient. The committee was instructed to request the Justices of the Peace throughout the County; to report to the committee as soon as possible, a list of families in their respective precincts in actual want, with the number of persons in each family so found in need. On motion, Francisco Armijo y Otero was chosen Secretary of the Committee. The lists on contributions were then opened and the following subscriptions were
